Monday, August 15, 2016, is the deadline to sign up for the Adopt-A-Tree program through the MDA. If you sign up by then, the Museum District Association will pay 50% of the cost, but only if you are a member of the MDA.

The MDA will contribute \$25 of the required \$50 tax-deductible contribution for MDA members who wish to participate in this year's program. Applications must be post-marked by Monday, August 15. Applications postmarked after that date will be returned. Trees will be planted later this fall or in the spring, depending upon the species.

Participants in the program agree to water the tree for the first two years as outlined in the application found on page 18 and in the Citizen Tree Maintenance Agreement found on the City of Richmond's website.

The tree canopy in Richmond is one of the most vital aspects of urban living. Trees help keep houses and yards cool, improve air quality, absorb rainwater, and help boost property values.

The Roseneath Median Project is still evolving. Recently, a majority of the board members met on the median, walked the length, and closely examined each component of the proposal in relation its current state. We have come to a consensus that the top priority items are improved turf and prevention of vehicles crossing the median. We plan to remove the mismatched, overgrown and misshapen shrubs, as well as the worn fences, and work toward a neat, manicured appearance that is easy and affordable to maintain. Roseneath Landscape Contractor Hired

Stretching over one-half mile from Monument Avenue to Grove Avenue, the Roseneath Road median is one of the largest green spaces in the Museum District. For many area residents, Roseneath Road is a main north-south thoroughfare through the neighborhood, connecting Broad Street to Grove Avenue.

This year, the board has committed to the beautification of the Roseneath median and to its maintenance and upkeep going forward. This effort is led by the Roseneath Committee, which comprises several board members and neighborhood residents.

This spring, the Museum District Association hired an area landscaping contractor to maintain the Roseneath median. This contractor is responsible for cutting and edging the median on a regular basis. In addition, the company will be repairing the tire tracks and soil damage that occurred during snowstorms this past winter. Early this fall, new grass will be planted over the entirety of the Roseneath median. Though it will take two to three years before the grass is fully established, we're confident it will be worth the wait!

Prior to seeding new grass, the existing shrubs, fences, and miscellaneous planting in the median will be removed. The Roseneath median will become consistent, manicured, and easy-to-maintain, similar to the Monument Avenue median. The two defining land-scape features of the Roseneath median will be well-maintained grass and the existing trees. The final step in the Roseneath median improvements will be the installation of decorative bollards at the intersections with alleyways to prevent vehicles from driving over the median at these locations.

Chiocca's Provides District with Good Eats

Did you know that Chiocca's Deli at 425 N Belmont was just voted "Best Sandwich Spot in the City of Richmond" by Style Weekly? Chiocca's was also recently selected as the second-best local sandwich shop in all of Central Virginia by Virginia Living Magazine.

Chiocca's is somewhat of a hidden treasure. Just like the famous "Cheers Bar and Grill," Chiocca's is located down a flight of stairs, in the basement of the house standing at the corner of Belmont and Kensington. The deli was founded in 1952 by Museum District resident Mario Chiocca, Sr. and later taken over by his son, Mario "Timmy" Chiocca Jr., who owned and operated the deli until 2010.

Scott Ripley, who was living in the Museum District at the time, was in the right place at the right time and was able to purchase this unique, family business in the heart of his own neighborhood. Ripley has carried on the family tradition of serving delicious food, sourcing local products, and providing a neighborhood gathering place that is open seven days a week.

Chiocca's has been affectionately coined the "Catholic Underground" as it has served as a gathering place for the Catholic congregations and students of the neighborhood. The deli is also a hot spot for Jeopardy fans on Tuesday nights, particularly the first Tuesday of each month during "Steal the Pint Night," when you can sample the newest beer on tap and take home your beer glass! You can also play trivia with your neighbors and be entertained by a local magician.

Ripley has maintained much of the original dining area, and the bar and kitchen, including the original oven. Decades of framed photographs of the Chiocca family, celebrity visitors, and local sports teams adorn the walls around the booths and tables. It's a cozy establishment with six beer taps and several local craft beers in bottles. The deli is also home to two unique flavors of homemade ice cream sandwiches found only at Chiocca's - Nightingale Black Raspberry and Peanut Butter - handmade in Richmond. That Hot Sauce, made in Richmond, is served on sandwiches and available for purchase.

Be sure to stop in soon and check out this underground treasure! Chiocca's is open 7 days a week from 11:30AM-12:00 midnight at Belmont & Kensington.

The Mayor's Participation, Action, and Communications Team (MPACT) is a city initiative that encourages community participation, drives city action, and fosters communication to develop a shared vision for Richmond's future.

MPACT is also a vehicle for reporting requests for service. City residents may submit a priority request through the city's website (Richmondgov.com), by calling 311, or via SeeClickFix (website and phone app). Monthly meetings are held throughout the city.

The meeting for the Third Police Precinct, which includes the Museum District, is held on the second Thursday of each month at 6:00 PM at the Byrd Park Round House. All residents are welcome. Representatives from the City are there to share information, receive concerns, and generally act as a resource for all residents.

What is SeeClickFix?

SeeClickFix is a request reporting vehicle under the MPACT umbrella. By accessing the city website or by smart phone app, residents can report a number of priority requests to the City.

You are able to upload a picture of the item you are reporting. For easiest reporting, download the SeeClickFix app. Categories are:



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Construction Starts on Redevelopment Project

I am pleased to announce that Oliver Properties has begun the redevelopment of the Hill Davis Building located at 3500 Kensington Avenue. This urban in-fill project will transform the antiquated medical office complex into a Class A apartment community.

The new community will be called *Carytown Crossing in the Museum District* and will contain 39 two-bedroom/two bath apartments, 11 one-bedroom/one-bath apartments, and a management office. Each apartment will feature hardwood floors, ceramic tile baths, walk-in showers, gourmet kitchens, in-unit laundry, vaulted ceilings, and private balconies. The building exterior is a mix of period brick and stone, and accented with large white columns and sweeping roofs.

Oliver Properties worked very closely with the community and Commonwealth Architects to create a design that enhances and complements the historic neighborhood. We also recognized the unique opportunity we had to design an entire city block in an estab-



lished and vibrant neighborhood like the Museum District.

The project will take approximately 12 months to build. We hope to welcome our first residents in late Spring 2017.

Rapid Transit Project Design Team Chosen

The Virginia Department of Transportation completed the procurement process for a design-build firm in April 2016 for the GRTC Pulse rapid transit project in Richmond. Three firms submitted technical and fee proposals, and the Lane Construction Corporation/STV Design team was selected. Following this selection, the Commonwealth Transportation Board ratified the decision to move forward with the Lane/STV team.

The plan outlined in Lane's technical proposal reflects everything presented to the public in 2015 and approved unanimously by the City of Richmond's Urban Design Committee and Planning Commission in November 2015.

The team is currently conducting a scope validation. During this process, the team is verifying site conditions of the corridor, and confirming information outlined in the scope of the project.

Final design is on-going. The current projected start of construction is September/October 2016. This date is



dependent on the Lane/STV team obtaining construction permits and the review and approval of the final design. Construction will be sequenced and performed in groups, with six stations being worked on, one at a time. More specific construction details will be available by August 2016.

The event was catered by Savory Grain which specializes in using locally sourced ingredients. Thanks also to Ardent Craft Ales for the locally crafted brews.



Neighbors Help Maintain Roseneath Trees

Below is a list of neighbors who have helped keep the new gingko trees alive in the median of Roseneath Road over the past two summers by donating water from their spigots. Dave Berg, MDA Environmental Chair for many years, was instrumental in pointing out that watering was needed. Richmond Tree Stewards provided the labor but all the water was provided by the generous folks below. The last time I checked only one tree died

out of the 40+ that were planted.

The city has limited resources to water all the trees planted each year, so the Tree Stewards sometimes volunteer to help supplement their efforts. In the case of Roseneath Road there

were a large number of trees planted in a relatively small area.

When our supplemental watering began I was trucking the water in. It took six pickup truck loads to water all the new trees in the median. I was near the Alexander's home and they offered to donate water for the trees on their block. They suggested other residents might also be willing to donate. No one I asked turned me down. The result is visible when you drive down Roseneath Road.

What you can do for new trees

Because so many trees were planted in a small area it was practical for the Tree Stewards to set this up as a project. However, the majority of new city trees in residential areas are widely distributed and, after planting, are usually given a green Gatorbag for watering.

I think the city hopes that residents will get the word, know what the bags are for, and help water them the first two years until they get established. My feeling is that very few people understand this. Most people assume incorrectly that the city is watering new trees.

If you see a new tree with a bag along the street in the vicinity of your home, please give it a hand. My rule is assume no one is watering a new tree unless you see them doing it. To get the best chance of survival, a new tree should be watered weekly for the first two years, from May through October. Just fill the bag (15 gallons) once a week. If a new tree looks like it needs water, it probably does, but by that time it may be too late.

It is best to get on a regular weekly watering schedule before it needs it. You will be the beneficiary of the shade and beauty it provides for many years if it makes it through the first two years. "Won't my water bill go up?" Including waste water charge the cost to fill a 15 gallon gator bag one time is less than 3.5 cents. The cost to fill one gator bag weekly from May 1 through Oct 30, 2016, would be only 90 cents. Pretty good deal to save a \$200 tree.

Wiley Exhibit Opens at VMFA

The latest special exhibit at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts runs through Sept. 5. Titled "Kehinde Wiley: A New Republic," the exhibit features the work of one of the most famous artists in the United States right now, Kehinde Wiley.

Wiley was born in Los Angeles in 1977. His father was from Nigeria and his mother was African-American. He earned his BFA from the San Francisco Art Institute in 1999 and his MFA from Yale University, School of Art in 2001.

Wiley's art tends to blur the lines between contemporary masters and modern art. He often features darkerskinned individuals in hip-hop clothes in a painting based on a traditional work of art. He bases the people in his painting on individuals that he photographs on the street.

Wiley's "Napoleon Leading the Army over the Alps" is an often cited example. It is based on a master piece by Jacques-Louis David. Instead of Napoleon on a horse, Wiley's version features a black man in a military clothes and a bandana.

The exhibit presents a retrospective of Wiley's prolific career through nearly 60 paintings and sculptures. Wiley's work raises intriguing questions about race, gender, and the politics of representation by portraying contemporary African American



men and women using the conventions of traditional European portraiture.

By replacing the European aristocrats with contemporary black subjects, Wiley's portraits draw attention to the absence of African Americans from historical and cultural narratives.


